And now I'll give brief bios for our panelists in the order they'll read here:

Julie Brooks Barbour's most recent poetry collection is *Haunted City* (Kelsay Books). A collection of essays co-edited with Mary Biddinger, *A Mollusk Without a Shell: Essays on Self-Care for Writers,* is forthcoming from The University of Akron Press in 2024. **Today she'll read poems** that

interrogate roles of women and the aging body, and examine the past in order to connect more fully with the self in the second half of life.

Mary Biddinger's most recent poetry collection is *Department of Elegy*, and her novella in flash, *The Girl with the Black Lipstick*, is forthcoming with Black Lawrence Press in 2025. She is co-editor, with Julie Brooks Barbour, of the essay collection *A Mollusk Without a Shell: Essays on Self-Care for Writers*. **Today she'll read poems** steeped in nostalgia for a past life, presented from the standpoint of a fortysomething Gen X woman experiencing boredom and survivor's guilt.

Cynthia Marie Hoffman is the author of four collections of poetry. Her newest collection, *Exploding Head*, is a memoir in prose poems about her lifelong journey with obsessive-compulsive disorder. All four books are published with Persea Books. She lives in Madison, WI. **Today she'll read poems** from her brand new, published-this-week fourth collection, *Exploding Head*, which views the anxieties of middle age through the lens of OCD—aging parents, the threat of one's own mortality, and impending empty nest.

Michelle Whittaker is a NYFA Poetry Fellow and author of the collection, *Surge* [great weather for Media]. She is an Associate Professor in Creative and Expository Writing and poetry editor for *The Southampton Review* at Stony Brook University. **Today she'll read poems** that delve into the intricacies and intrigues of middle age, exploring how reproductive challenges can impact the dynamics of a marriage and identity.

And I'll read last. Again, my name is Sarah Kain Gutowski, and I'm the author of *The Familiar*, a fabulist, absurdist narrative-in-poems about midlife crisis, particularly from a female point of view. **I'll be reading** a selection from this book, which is about 6 days old, and is being launched here at AWP.
